WELCOME BACK EAGLES!

I can't believe it is already January! It seems like yesterday we were greeting returning students and colleagues as we kicked off a new academic year. From the grand opening of our Athletic Performance Center to the launch of our recruiting trailer, the energy at Meridian Community College this fall has been special. You may know, for example, that MCC was one of six community colleges in the nation to be chosen for the NASA Aerospace Community College Scholars program. In addition to our own students, we hosted groups from 11 states for a week, who were taught and mentored by personnel from Stennis, Marshall, and Johnson Space Centers. I spent a few hours with the group and could not have been more impressed. The best and brightest often choose to attend community colleges, and I was privileged to meet many that week.

It was no accident we were chosen to host the NASA-sponsored event. Two of our faculty members--Ms. Valerie Bishop and Dr. Angie Carraway--spent countless hours researching, writing, waiting, and working until the selections were made and the event was complete.

They are a great example of what I see every day at MCC--committed faculty and staff members who love what they do and pursue their work with passion, persistence, and an understanding that their investment in others matters.

We have MCC employees who spend hours "off the clock" tutoring students who are struggling academically while others invest personal time and resources in teaching students that alongside the opportunity of education comes the responsibility of service. I know you are familiar with My College Cares and the more than 1,200 students, faculty, and staff members who volunteered in a one-day service blitz designed to make a difference in our community, but you may not know about the hundreds of service hours completed by, for example, our Honors students in a given year. I often say that service is "in the water" at Meridian Community College.

My understanding, as they say, "got real" for me in the last few months. Many of you may know about my health scare toward the end of the fall semester. On November 21st I had a heart attack a few days later, I had quadruple bypass surgery. During my 12 days in the hospital I had the opportunity to talk to dozens of healthcare professionals. As is my normal habit, I asked as many as I could where they attended college, and I was so pleased to learn that many were graduates of MCC.



I heard countless stories about their experiences as students, and they used words like "tough," "challenging," "loved," and "wonderful." The stories were great, and they made me proud of the place I work. My care was truly outstanding; in fact, I would describe it as professional and compassionate.

My health crisis allowed me to experience what I see around me every day. My healthcare providers approached their work like they do because it is how they were taught! Whether the subject is literature or linear equations, cosmetology or construction, data or dental hygiene, an MCC education is unique and special. We open doors, prepare our students to be successful, and teach them the importance of service to others. I can't think of a more worthwhile higher education opportunity!

COMING HOME

To say it's been a whirlwind year for Leia Hill would be an understatement. But this motivated, energetic MCC leader is eager to help others find their wings.

Hill also worked at the College in the Foundation's office from 2006 to 2014 as program coordinator of the College's Arts & Letters Series and Lifetime Quest program. "It was a very special time in my life," Hill said, "I met so many wonderful people and formed strong relationships - that I still cherish today."

All of these changes are in response to growth in the Foundation. We are positioning ourselves for a prosperous future and with the above staff have no doubts that we will be successful.

We reported in April that \$1,052,708.00 was raised for the 2018 - 2019 Campaign. This year's campaign is called **2020... A Clear Vision for the Future**. The Faculty/Staff Campaign was completed in August. The totals from that effort equaled \$33,428 - which is up from last year, and our number of participants increased as well. That is something to be excited about.

We are starting this year up, and hope that trend continues. Thank you all for your support. It really means so much!

NICHOLSON-TAYLOR RECEIVES HUMANITIES HONOR



Meridian Community College Art Instructor Terrell Nicholson-Taylor is the recipient of the 2019-2020 Mississippi Humanities Teacher of the Year from MCC.

The award recognizes the contribution of humanities faculty at each of the state's colleges and universities.



"I believe art is a sacred expression of what it means to be human. I am a humanist, so I try to share that point with my students, and anyone I come in contact with," Nicholson-Taylor said.

As a part of the award, each honoree is required to give a public lecture. Nicholson-Taylor will present her talk on Friday, Feb. 21, at 10:30 a.m. in the Casteel Gallery, located in the foyer of the L.O. Todd-Billy C. Beal Learning Resources Building. Her lecture, "Give me STEAM: Art Education as an Extraordinary Experience," is free and open to the public.

Nicholson-Taylor holds three master-level degrees; a master of fine arts, a master of art education, and a master of art in anthropology. Her bachelor of science is in anthropology. She has served as an MCC art instructor for 15 years. She has garnered accolades at the College, including the recipient of the Moody Institute Trust Fund Professional Development Grant and Holladay Family Professional Development Award. Internationally, she has also served as artist

presenter and artistin-residence at the International Conference on Cast Iron Sculpture in Gdansk, Poland, and was a participant in Summer Artist in Residence: La Maciana di San Cresci, Greve en Chianti, Italy.

Her work has also been on display at Alabama Art Casting, Lauren Rogers Museum of Art, Kentuck Arts and Crafts Fair and Meridian Museum of Art.

"I think everyone has the potential to be an artist. I believe in potential, and in the creative endeavor," Nicholson-Taylor said.

As chair holder, Ethridge will have the opportunity to initiate or refine course or program development, purchase books, materials and or equipment to improve a course or program and/or time to travel and study to develop new programs, performances or events.

"This is overwhelming. There are so many things you want to do to help students meet their goals in life, and a lot of times, technology is the barrier. But this award will help bring new technology to the program," said Ethridge, adding, "This is such a game-changer for our program."

NOMADS NO MORE: STAGE 2 FINDS HOME AT MCC

Stage 2, the theatrical training group for youths 13-19, is now at home at MCC's McCain Theater stage, said Susie Johnson, MCC director of the Arts & Letters Series, and the founder of Stage 2.

"Coming home to MCC has been a blessing and relief ... we've been nomads for 10 years," said Johnson. Temporary home bases numbered at least five while practices were held in venues including church basements to parking lots.

The youth-centered troupe - those turning 13 years of age during the school year through age 19 is much more than just putting on a show. Emphasis is on character development, teamwork and community service. "Working off stage is just as important for a show as being on stage," Johnson said. 

The economic value of community colleges illustrated his point. Some 16,000-plus jobs are supported by expenditures of Mississippi community college operating budgets and students. He also said there is a \$980 million direct and indirect labor impact while there is \$128 million in tax revenue.

More than 8,870 community college graduates entering the Mississippi workforce generate \$980 million is wages and salaries annually.

For every state tax dollar invested in community colleges, Mississippi gets back \$4.86 - a 386 percent net return on investment.

"It's part of the story we need to tell - we need to do a better job telling," Dr. Huebner said. He added, "we are thrilled to be a part of this community and to have a great relationship with elected officials, those in K-12 education and friends at Mississippi State University, as we think about moving forward together."

He said he's excited about moving forward as the next state legislative session gets underway. Dr. Huebner added, "I think we have big things ahead of us."



Teams and mock companies were created to build a Mars rover from an EV3 Lego kit. Their mission: to win an engineering design and robotics competition.



Upon his discharge from military service he moved back to his home town to practice family medicine. He completed his residency in New Orleans and moved to Meridian to begin his obstetric and gynecological practice and worked until his retirement in 1995.
